Memorial Dedicated

Lenny Lassar, President of the 15th Infantry Regiment Association was among those present for the dedication of the 3rd Infantry Division memorial at the Florida National Cemetery by the John S. Cole, Outpost #2 of the Society of the 3rd Infantry Division on Veterans Day 2001.

Other Can Do Association members present were MG Maury Kendall, Joe Poggi, Edwin Kruger & Jim Tiezzi, as the Master of Ceremony. LTG Robert McAlister of OP#2 was present, also.

The detailed construction of the monument impressed the gathering of over 60 people. The monument occupies a strategic location along the Memorial Trail in the Bushnell, Florida National Cemetery.

The memorial was dedicated to honor all our veterans of the 3rd Infantry Division.

Help Wanted

The 1st Battalion is involved in improving a significant historical monument presented to the 15th Infantry Regiment and currently located at Fort Benning. The monument was presented by the citizens of a city in China for assuring their safety in the 1920s and 1930s. It is configured to depict a gate to a city and is referred to as the China Gate. The monument was dedicated to the US Army Infantry School at Fort Benning in 1939, after the Regiment's return to this continent.

The objective of the battalion is to restore the monument to the prominence it deserves and erect a proper shelter. The initial effort is to build a Chinese style roof over the monument. Other improvements envisioned are appropriate descriptive plaques, benches and improved landscaping. The unit is constrained in the amount of funds it can acquire and use for the upgrade. The Association has a monument fund obtained from periodic member's contributions. Currently the fund is just over \$1000. Occasionally expenditures are made from the fund to maintain and upgrade other monuments previously dedicated to the Regiment. This is an appeal for members to contribute donations to increase the fund balance in order for the Association to provide some monetary assistance to the 1st Battalion in their worthy effort.

ATTENTION SNOWBIRDS AND MULTIPLE ADDRESSEES

My first meeting with Leonard Lassar was in March of 1953 when he was a slender, teenage combat medic with a Battle Patrol of the Regiment. The Battle Patrol was established by Colonel Richard G. Stilwell who was our Regimental Commander at the time. The purpose of the patrol was to obtain more intelligence on the CCF forces we were facing in the Chorwon Valley, Kumwha sector of the Iron Triangle. The platoon sized Battle Patrol was sent out almost every night with all members armed with automatic weapons for maximum firepower. CCF POW's for intelligence purposes were the main objective. After serving on line with George Company, I was assigned to the regimental staff as Assistant S-2. In this capacity, I was assigned to be in charge of the Battle Patrol by the Regimental Commander. This is how I met Leonard.

In 1988, I retired from 36 years of coaching and teaching in secondary public schools. Shortly thereafter I joined the 3rd Infantry Society in hope of locating my platoon sergeant, Nile Stuart who kept a green Brown Bar alive on line in Korea. In 1990, 47 years after first meeting Leonard, he responded to a letter I wrote to *The Watch on the Rhine* and *Grey Beards* attempting to locate 15th Infantry survivor's of the June '53 battle to hold OP Harry. Leonard was a WIA in this action. Since this contact, we have attended several reunions together and have become close friends. During our friendship these past ten years, Leonard has shown the qualities necessary to be a strong leader, namely, organization, ability to take charge, loyalty, common sense, dedication generosity, and consideration.

Knowing Leonard, my opinion is that he will provide continued stroon leadership for the Regimental Association for the next two years.

Lenny's Message

Lenny's Trip South

My wife and I were flying to Phoenix, on September 11, 2001, when we were told about the planes crashing into the World Trade Center. I felt cheated because I couldn't attend the Society of the Third Infantry Division reunion, with my friends, and meet our active duty members. So I decided to take a trip South.

My wife and I left Dover, NH on October 31st and headed to Manassas, VA., where LTC Mike Slater lives. LTC Slater is a Marine. He's also an Author. He's writing a book on "The Siege of Outpost Harry". As you know our Regiment was the main force that held the Outpost in a 10 day battle in June of 1953. Being a Marine, I brought him lots of documents, pictures, and letters that I have, so Mike can write a better book. I told his wife Darlene, that I'd be back in two weeks to pick-up my material that I was leaving with her that afternoon. Then it was on to Fort Stewart!

It was late Thursday when we got to Richmond Hills, GA. So we got a motel room for the night. When we organized "The 15th Infantry Regiment Association" in 1993, there was a Captain Twitty commanding Baker Company, now that man is LTC Stephen Twitty, the 3rd Battalion Commander. LTC Twitty invited me to a Formal Mess at 1800hrs. that night. I was proud to accept. It was a nice dinner and we had a lot of fun afterwards, except for Mr. Vice and the Punchbowl. About 12:30, I needed some medication and sleep. With that I drove back to the motel. I met LT Freeman at the Battalion HQ about 10:00 hrs., so I could pick up some copies of the Dragon, which I could give to the men of Baker Company when I join them at their reunion on Monday morning at Ormond Beach, Florida.

The members of Baker Company consist of veterans of the Korean War. John & Mary Gogliettino with the help of Vera & Don Sonsalla did a very good job on the reunion. The main purpose of this reunion being held in Ormond Beach was to honor PFC Emory Bennett, who received the Medal of Honor on June 24th, 1951 as a member of Baker Company. There is a Emory Bennett VA Nursing Home in Ormond Beach, and a Emory Bennett Memorial Park, in back of the Chamber of Commerce Building, in New Smyrna Beach, Florida.

We arrived at the Florida National Veterans Cemetery on time for their Veterans Day Ceremonies, which was very impressive. The weather was a little cool in the shade, but it warmed up by noon. Then we drove over to Committal Shelter A, where Angelo "Jim" Tiezzi, the President of OP 2, dedicated a very nice monument to the memory of the men of the 3rd Infantry Division.

The membership of OP 2 has a monument worthy of great pride on the Path of Honor. The US Flag and the shoulder sleeve insignia of the 3rd Division are both in color which is pretty on the stone. Jim and the members of OP 2 had a cookout planned for that afternoon, but we were just too tired to eat. Instead we headed for Ft. Benning, Georgia, which made my wife very happy!

We arrived at Ft. Benning, early in the afternoon on the 12th, and we went looking for the Battalion Headquarters. The 1st Battalion is getting a new home. There we met LTC Dennis Smith. Remember him from Ft. Stewart's Rendezvous? Tall, slim and about 193lbs. He's going to put on a great Rendezvous in April. So mark your calendars for the week of April 24th, 2002, and come and join the Party.

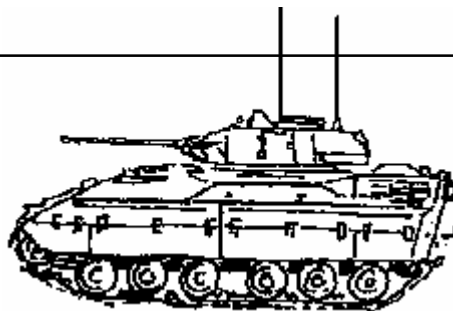
My wife had been out of a pill she needed since we were at Ft. Stewart and I still had two full days of driving, so we headed for Atlanta and I-95 on the Coast line and back to Manassas, VA to pick-up the package I left there 13 days ago.

LTC Mike Slater wasn't home but I spoke to him on the phone. He told me that he had copied all the papers I left him, and they were a big help to him. With a Marine writing about the Army, he needs all the help we can give him, so that was the reason I stopped at his house.

We got back home the afternoon of November 14th and I found 153 messages on my computer, which took me 4 days to answer. We drove 4,200 miles in two weeks and saw everyone we hoped to see except John Burke and Malvin Goldstein, who I hope to see in April.

I was 18 years old when I met COL Richard G. Stilwell, Dr. Lee, LT Mueller and LT Braucher and many other friends who made me a better soldier, and the war in the Mideast isn't going to change my life style, and I'll see you all in April.
