
End Of Year Inventory

The unaudited interim report published on the Page 9 is to give you an overview of our financial condition.

A special" Thanks" goes out to all who participated in our annual raffle this year; it bolstered our overall balance by \$1890.43.

Several of our members have converted to "life membership" this year. 100% of these payments have been transferred to the "Life Membership Fund" account. Also, \$500.00 from the proceeds of our raffle was transferred to the "Life Fund." This money is being held in our various accounts as listed below. All interest earned on our funds, regardless of where they are deposited, is credited to the "Life Membership Fund." The balance in this fund is now \$19,292.36.

Historian's Report-60th Anniversary Ceremonies in France September 2004

This past month has been one of the most rewarding of my time in the Army. On 18 August my wife and I were able to meet the 3d Infantry Division veterans who came over for the 60th anniversary of the division's landings in Southern France. We were able to spend several days with them while they toured their battlefields in the area of the Colmar Pocket and the breakout from the Vosges Mountains. They were received with great gratitude by the villages and towns they had liberated 60 years ago – Colmar, Sigolsheim, Holtzwihr, Bennwihr, Mutzig, Strasbourg, among others. Monika and I were amazed at the stamina of our veterans; they had very long days and some very hot weather. We had such a wonderful time with the vets, their families, and the survivors of some of our departed veterans.

Then, this past week, 8-14 September, we were able to return to France to support several ceremonies commemorating the liberation of some well-known cities and towns, as well as some smaller villages. On the evening of 8 September we represented the US Army and the 3d Infantry Division at the ceremony in Besancon. The ceremony was very impressive, and it was great to see a lot of young people involved in it. Monika, as a retiree, wore her uniform with 3d Infantry Division patch, and was a huge hit with many of the older citizens who were in Besancon when the division liberated the town. The US Consul General from Strasbourg, Chris Davis, was also there, as well as an Olmstead Scholar studying in Strasbourg, Army Major Alan Pepper. So, one diplomat and 3 officers in uniform provided the only US presence there, but we were there!

On 12 September, Monika and I participated in a ceremony in Saulx-de-Vesoul. As the regimental historian I was asked to represent the Regiment and give a speech. It was a wonderful ceremony, beginning with an ecumenical church service, followed by the ceremony during which a marble plaque in honor of the division and civilian casualties from the fighting there was unveiled, and wrapped up with a wonderful luncheon. This is the first commemoration that Saulx has held, and they did it right. Later in the evening the mayor and several of his councilmen took us to the location of John Tominac's action in the town and provided further details on what happened in the town. This was followed by a great dinner.

Also on 12 September we attended a ceremony in Dampvalley les Columbe, a village of less than 150 people, which was liberated by the 39th FA and elements of the 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry. It was a wonderful ceremony, with a retired 3-star French general in attendance, as well as the squadron commander of the nearby stationed Lafayette Squadron, famous for the fact that US fliers of WWI served in this French unit before US entry into the war. We were very happily received there, once again as the only Americans in attendance. As best we could tell, we were the first US soldiers to visit the village since the end of the war.

After Dampvalley, we drove to Vesoul for its ceremony, which was quite large. It included flyovers by French fighter aircraft, re-enactors with authentic vehicles, and participation of local French military units. Consul General Davis was present, but the only US uniforms to be seen were Monika's and mine. At the reception after the ceremony the Mayor thanked us in front of all the guests for attending and representing the veterans who had fought there.

Throughout the day we felt tremendous pride representing the United States, the 3d Infantry Division, and the 15th Infantry Regiment. We were basking in the reflected glory of all the veterans who fought through the Franche Comte, and were very glad we had decided to take leave to enable our being in France for the September commemorations.

On the 13th we traveled to the US cemetery and monument outside of Epinal with the Mayor and councilmen from Saulx. It is a sobering experience to see the rows of headstones, yet it is uplifting to see the honor with which our country treats its war dead. It was a deeply emotional experience for our friends from Saulx.

On the 14th, we attended a small ceremony in Port-sur-Saone, a town liberated by the 36th Division on 12 September. No one from the 36th Division society was able to attend, but we were more than happy to represent the US Army and the 36th Division with our participation. The Mayor was truly appreciative and treated us royally.

After participating in these ceremonies we drove the Regiment's route north through the Vosges and on to Strasbourg. Incredible terrain, and we could only imagine how much worse it could have been in the winter, which is when our men went through there.

We are looking forward to the December through February timeframe, as we will be able to attend ceremonies in the Colmar Pocket area.

We both come away from the past week and a half impressed with the deep appreciation the older generation of French who experienced WWII feel towards the United States and the US Army soldiers who fought here. We are also very happy to see that this generation is making a strong effort to pass this feeling on to the younger generation.



I was in the 1st Battalion in Korea from February 52 to November 52. I was in the Intel and Recon. I will always remember something that happened. Our Battalion Commander at the time was Colonel Mills Hatfield. He was a very good commander in our eyes. He told us to always look out for each other. We had left the front lines and were sent to Pusan for a month to guard prisoners that were being screened to stay South or go back North. I was CO one night at the gate. Sergeant Bob Search from Holland, Michigan was in charge. He got a call from someone saying one of our people was in Pusan drunk and in trouble. He couldn't find a Jeep anywhere, so he took the Colonel's Jeep with all the big radios on it. It wasn't long after this that the Colonel came down to the gate looking for his jeep. He was slapping his side with his swagger stick. He looked at me and said, "Depew, where's my jeep?". I explained the situation to him, but he was pretty anxious. About an hour later Search came driving up. The Colonel said "Search, who told you that you could take my jeep?". Search, without hesitating said, "Colonel, you told us to look out for each other and there was no other way to get to Pusan.". The Colonel interrupted and said, "Except in my jeep." After a minute or two Colonel Hatfield said, "Well, I'm glad you're looking out for each other." Then he said to his driver, "Let's go." When the Colonel wasn't looking, the driver looked at me and ran his hand across his brow. I guess it was things like this that made us care for Colonel Hatfield so much. I have never heard anything about him since then. But he was a Commander that you couldn't forget.
