1st Battalion SITREP

Since our last newsletter, the CAN DO Soldiers of this battalion have completed a wide variety of training with the skill of seasoned professionals. October saw the end of train-up and testing for the Expert Infantryman Badge (EIB), hosted by the Maneuver Center of Excellence (MCoE) as well as Excellence in Armor (EIA) training here on Fort Benning. Upon completion of EIB and EIA testing, the battalion returned to collective training at the platoon and company level, focused on sustaining proficiency for potential regionally aligned missions in support of U.S. Northern Command. Last month's training highlight was the completion of a battalion-wide simulations exercise, starting with the battalion staff conducting the Military Decision Making Process (MDMP) and preparing an operations order (OPORD) where the battalion was on the offense against a near-peer competitor state. All tank and Bradley fighting vehicle crewmen, infantry squads, mortars, scouts and battalion staff were placed in respective simulators, in a virtual training environment.

3rd Battalion News

It has been an exciting quarter for the China Dragons! In October we conducted Operation China Focus I, a 15-day field training exercise that consisted of Squad Live Fire Exercises, Platoon Situational Training Exercises, Platoon Live Fire Exercises, and Company Attack and Defense Lanes. We also conducted 10 Company air-assaults as part of this field problem. In November we conducted recovery operations and participated in Marne Week: the highlight which was 1LT Nick Richardson (HHC/3-15 IN) winning the heavyweight bracket at the fiercely contested grappling competition.

Then in December we conducted Operation China Focus 2, which consisted of a 30-hour Battalion level air-assault, movement to contact, and deliberate attack at the Bastogne MOUT site. As part of this exercise, the Soldiers of 3-15 IN conducted a 17 hour long dismounted infiltration with body armor and full combat load: demonstrating their high level of physical readiness, tenacity, and tactical competence along the way. The Battalion also conducted a second iteration of Platoon Live Fire Exercises as part of this field problem. We wrapped up December with a Company and Battalion level virtual computer simulation exercise and block leave preparation. In the New Year the Battalion will complete the official Marne Inspection Program inspection in early January, then will execute a three-week training exercise (Vanguard Focus) to validate that the Battalion is prepared to go to JRTC in the early summer.

The culminating exercise consisted of the battalion conducting an attack against a mechanized infantry company in simple battle positions, defeating an initial armor company counterattack, then transitioning to the defense to defeat an armor brigade's counterattack supported by massed fires and a sortie of MI-35s. Overall feedback from the leaders and Soldiers involved in the SIMEX has been overwhelmingly positive and all involved are better trained because of the event.

In addition to performing the battalion SIMEX, Soldiers and leaders from across the battalion conducted the first week-long density of the Dragon Leader Academy (DLA). DLA, comprised of monthly modules covering foundational, tactical and self-study topics, is designed to build competent and capable squad leaders, platoon sergeants, and platoon leaders. Throughout the November density week, leaders from across the battalion attended classes covering Leadership and the Army Profession; 15th Infantry History (taught by Mike Horn); command supply and maintenance discipline, Counseling, Awards/Admin Actions, NCO and officer evaluation and NCO/officer boards.

The remainder of November witnessed our CAN DO professionals competing in an international squad competition, hosted by 3rd brigade, pitting squads from the US, Canadian and Mexican militaries in a rigorous physical, mental and tactical crucible. Continuing the spirit of friendly competition, we also deployed a team to Fort Stewart to compete in the annual MARNE week games, ran by the 3rd Infantry Division. Our Soldiers represented the Regiment as true professionals during both events. For December, we continue with preparations for our conversion from a combined arms battalion (CAB) to an infantry battalion with continued property inspections, inventories and maintenance. Following the high operations tempo of the past few months, our Soldiers and Families are ready for a much deserved holiday season.

CSM Campbell and I are extremely thankful for what our Soldiers, Leaders and Families accomplish every day to add to the historic lineage of our CAN DO team. Serving with this organization is truly a privilege and we are honored to work alongside these true professionals.

At This Time In Regimental History

1865 – The Regiment was garrisoned on Lookout Mountain, Chattanooga, TN and would stay there until the end of the war.

1915 – The Regimental Headquarters and the 2nd and 3rd Battalions were stationed in Tientsin, China with the 1st Bn in the Philippines.

1945 – Beginning 23 January the Regiment participated in the Battle of the Colmar Pocket after having experienced very difficult combat liberating the towns of Bennwihr, Mittelwihr, and Sigolsheim and Hill 351 between 20 and 28 December 44 with Medals of Honor later awarded to Gus Kefurt, Keith L. Ware, and Eli Whitely for their actions there. Audie Murphy Medal of Honor action on 26 January outside of Holtzwihr, France.

1955 – The Regiment was stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia after having returned from Korea in 1954.

Can Do soldier selected to be the next Sergeant Major of the Army

1st Battalion Reorganization at Fort Benning

On 25 June 2013, the Department of the Army released a Draft Army Structure Message detailing how Brigades would be restructured to support the Army 2020 Brigade Combat Team design. Some Brigades were inactivated, while others, such as 3rd Brigade, were tasked to restructure to meet the strategic force structure requirements of the Army. Kelley Hill will undergo many changes between now and the dead line of 15 September 2015. 2-69 Armor will be inactivated and replaced by 2-16 IN. However, 1-15 IN will remain as the corner stone of 3rd BDE, and continue to add to our rich heritage for many years to come.

The transition process is currently underway and will continue in the coming months. All excess property and property associated with an Armored Brigade Combat Team (ABCT) will eventually be transferred to other units throughout the Army. 1-15 IN will then field all necessary equipment to transition smoothly from a Combined Arms Battalion into a Light Infantry Battalion. All 19-series (armor crewmen) Soldiers within our Battalion will be consolidated into Delta Company. Alpha and Bravo companies will supply one platoon each to fill Charlie Company, and provide the essential leadership to transition from an Armor Company into an Infantry Company. All 19-series Soldiers will eventually depart and Delta Company will begin transforming into a Heavy Weapons Company.

This transition will be exciting for all Infantry Soldiers as they will begin by training the fundamentals. January of 2015 will begin with basic rifle marksmanship and progress to advanced rifle marksmanship. This will transition into team, squad, platoon, and company live fires as they prepare for a JRTC rotation. The culmination of this training will allow 1st Bn to fulfill its higher mission and support the Northern Command Regionally Aligned Force. All of us in the 1st Bn are making this transition as seamless as possible by minimizing the impact on Soldiers and their families, while maintaining transparency across all levels of leadership. President's Message

I am writing this on Christmas Eve, 24 December 2014. 70 years ago today our great Regiment was fighting in Alsace – grinding away on Hill 351 outside of Sigolsheim, fighting in the villages of Mittelwihr, Bennwihr, and Sigolsheim. On 23 Dec Gus Kefurt was KIA in Bennwihr but received the MOH for his combat actions. LTC Keith Ware would receive the MOH for actions on Hill 351 on 26 Dec and LT Eli Whitely for his actions on 27 Dec. It was not a peaceful Christmas for them, or for anyone in the 15th Infantry. It wasn't the first Christmas spent in combat nor the last, but that Christmas in 1944 left an indelible mark on the history of our Regiment.

2014 was a good year for our Regiment. Both our battalions are home for the holidays after a great year of outstanding training and missions. Mike Horn succeeded in the dedication of the Regular Brigade monument at Kennesaw Mountain! As you will read in this issue a plaque honoring Audie Murphy on the location of his Distinguished Service Cross action at Ramatuelle, France was dedicated on 14 August. This plaque was the culmination of four years working with Mr. Patrice de Colmont who owns the property where Audie and his platoon fought. William Carson, our first Medal of Honor recipient from the Civil War was honored on a plaque at Chickamauga in September. And there is continued movement on SFC Cashe's Silver Star being upgraded to the Medal of Honor.

Late January and early February I will be traveling to Alsace with Monika to participate in numerous commemorations connected the 70th anniversary of the Battle of the Colmar Pocket. It will be an honor to once again represent the Association and our great Regiment where the Regiment performed so magnificently.

2015 will also mark the 65th anniversary of the outbreak of the Korean War, where our Regiment again performed superbly beginning in November 1950 after landing at Wonsan. We are exploring opportunities for dedicating a monument to the Regiment in Korea in either 2015 or 2016. The first UN unit to enter Seoul for its final liberation on 14 March 1951 was the Regiment's Can Do Raider Platoon of KATUSAs led by US officers and NCOs. The monument could be dedicated at the location where they entered Seoul.

Our Association continues to face major challenges. We need to increase our membership. We are at less than half of our membership from several years ago. I ask each of you for creative ideas on how to attract new members. We continue to have open positions in the Association staff. We need members to step up and make our Association the best veterans' association in the country!

There are two events which will take place in the Washington, DC area this year that are of interest to our members. On 28 May OP International, Society of the 3rd Infantry Division and the Austrian Embassy will host a ceremony, reception, and historical seminar on the liberation of Salzburg in May 1945 in Arlington, VA and Washington, DC. Our Regiment participated in that final campaign of WWII in Europe and Audie Murphy received his Medal of Honor on 2 June 1945 in Salzburg. There will also be a historical seminar on the 6th Army Group's Campaign in France August 1944 to March 1945. That will be held between 17-19 September at the Sheraton National Hotel and Arlington Cemetery in Arlington, VA. Please mark these events in your calendars and join us.

Tad Davis is hard at work coordinating the Regimental Dinner to be held on 12 June during the Society of the 3rd ID's annual reunion in Charleston, SC. I look forward to seeing many of you there!

Our battalions continue the Regiment's proud traditions well. The 1st Battalion is going back to an Infantry TOE, meaning the Regiment will be non-mechanized for the first time since 1963! We continue to keep our fingers crossed that any future Army reductions will not adversely impact the 15th Infantry. What we really wish for is that the 2nd Battalion come back on active duty for the first time since 1996!!

Thank you all for your continued support. I wish everyone all the best for a great 2015!

**Plaque Honoring Audie Murphy DSC Action Dedicated
Can Do Mike Halik Returns to Southern France for First Time since 15 August 1944**

On 14 August 2014 Mr. Mike Halik, one of our 15th Infantry Regiment WWII veterans who was wounded in a minefield on 15 August 1944, along with his daughter Debbie and son Keith, participated in the dedication of a commemorative plaque honoring Audie Murphy at the location of Murphy's Distinguished Service Cross action at Les Bouis in Ramatuelle. The ceremony was hosted and the plaque sponsored by Mr. Patrice de Colmont, proprietor of the Les Bouis estate and owner of Club 55 on Pampelonne Beach - the beach where the 15th Infantry landed at 0800 on 15 August 1944.

Mayor Bruno of Ramatuelle, Mr. de Colmont, and Monika Stoy, from the Society of the 3ID, all delivered comments in honor of the occasion.

The Mayor of Salzburg, Austria, Dr. Heinz Schaden, accompanied by Mrs Jianzhen Schaden, traveled over 1000 km to be present for the ceremony! The 15th Infantry started its European campaign at Ramatuelle, and ended it in May 1945 in Salzburg! Audie Murphy received his Medal of Honor in a ceremony held in Salzburg on 2 June 1945.

Mr. Marc Tastenoy and Mr. Julian Auvertin of the reenactment group Var 39-45 were dressed in accurate period uniforms and represented the soldiers of yesterday well. It was a wonderful ceremony, with local French veterans present as well as representatives from patriotic organizations. The Yellow Ribbon fife and drum corps provided excellent musical support.

After the ceremony I led the group over the terrain of Audie Murphy's DSC fight. It is much more challenging than depicted in To Hell and Back! This particular battlefield is now an organic farm where Mr. de Colmont produces excellent vegetables used in his club's kitchen and grapes for the noted Les Bouis wine.

Before heading to Club 55 for a delicious lunch hosted by Mr. de Colmont the group drove to La Croix-Valmer to visit the 3rd Infantry Division's beach head monument there. This was especially meaningful to Mike Halik who had never seen it before.

We were served a wonderful meal at Club 55, one of the most famous clubs in the world. Words cannot describe the quantities and wonderful flavors of the food served, and Patrice was a wonderful host. We presented him certificates of appreciation from the Society of the 3ID and the 15th Infantry Regiment Association, a Can Do blazer badge, a Can Do coffee mug, and numerous other 15th Infantry and 3rd ID items. Patrice presented us with nice Club 55 gifts, but most importantly with wonderful memories and a pilgrimage site to return to with the Audie Murphy plaque!

The day was capped off by a visit to Yellow Beach where our Can Do men landed on 15 August 1944. Walking from Club 55 straight on to the beach, Mike Halik trod once again the fateful sand where he stepped on a land mine on August 1944. This time there were no mines, just curious onlookers as they watched him doggedly make his way through the sand to the water's edge. There were tears and many eyes as we watched him and saw the fierce determination in his eyes.

The following morning we returned to the beach one more time for Ramatuelle's liberation ceremony at the 7th Army Monument on Boulevard Patch. The ceremony began at 0830, just 30 minutes later than the actual landing 70 years previously. The scene was quiet, as beach goers were not yet swarming the beach. It was a solemn ceremony. Mike Halik received the town of Ramatuelle's medal

from Mayor Bruno, as did veterans from John Shirley's Society of the 3rd Infantry Division's 70th anniversary tour which included John, Pat Heagherty and Charles Condren, all Can Do veterans.
